Subject Entry Requirements: A Grade 7 in both GCSE Biology and GCSE Maths is advised.

Subject outline

The specification provides full detail of the eight topics studied:

- Biological molecules
- Cells
- Organisms exchange substances with their environment
- Genetic information, variation and relationships between organisms
- Energy transfers in and between organisms
- Organisms respond to changes in their internal and external environments
- Genetics, populations, evolution and ecosystems
- The control of gene expression

How is the course assessed?

Three two-hour written papers are taken at the end of Year 13.

There is no separate practical assessment; practical competency is continually assessed during regular class practical work, and questions assessing practical skills will be included in the written papers.

Why study this subject?

Biology is a dynamic and high-performing department, supported by six specialist teachers and six fully equipped laboratories. This depth of expertise, combined with a strong focus on academic excellence, ensures pupils receive outstanding teaching and expert guidance, giving them the best possible opportunity to achieve exceptional results.

The course is designed not only to secure exam success, but to develop confident, independent thinkers with a genuine understanding of the living world. Pupils are supported throughout with a comprehensive textbook and carefully structured resources that enable them to fulfil their potential.

A standout feature of the course is the summer term fieldwork experience at the beautiful and biodiverse Attenborough Nature Reserve. Here, pupils think and work like field scientists, collecting and analysing ecological data as part of the required
